What piece of bike infrastructure is needed next in your city?

Secure bike storage AND fixing the "gaps" in the cycling network for better flow.

Do you agree that e-bikes and other micro-mobility have great potential and can be a game changer for a suburban community like Maple Ridge? Explain.

What piece of bike infrastructure is needed next in your city?

In the core we need to ensure our east west corridors are multi modal Dewdney and Brown are prime for whats called the Brown ave couplet where Brown is two lanes going west and Dewdney is three lanes going east. We already own the right of way. This would open things up in the core allowing for more room for two legs and two wheels. Outside of the core the Lougheed bike way is extendable given the opportunity Dewdney not so much so the north south connections will mean a lot in the long run.

Not all electrics will be cars and in the future cars will be much smaller and dedicated to moving people and groceries. The breakdown of retail will mean much more will be delivered. What piece of bike infrastructure is needed next in your city?

We are very deficient in sensible & safe bike lanes; this would be what we need most to encourage cyclists.

Do you agree that e-bikes and other micro-mobility have great potential and can be a game changer for a suburban community like Maple Ridge? Explain.

I believe we need to improve the infrastructure which will encourage bikes, ebikes and pedestrian activity. Especially with the increased densification and potentially thousands of new residents in the downtown core, we have the opportunity to create an environment where vehicles are not required for accessing basic amenities. A major concern for this type of transportation is safety; we need to develop these strategies with safety and ease of access (secure places to park bikes) top of mind.

HUB Cycling has released a Cycling Platform. Which focus areas and points do you endorse, and which ones do you disagree with?

I have endorsed the platform. Developing cycling (and pedestrian) infrastructure can benefit our communities in so many ways; reduction of carbon emissions, ease of traffic congestion, improved health & well-being of citizens.

I don't disagree with any of the main contentions, but I think it would be worth considering how we connect transit plans with accessibility to cycling & walking; the Maple Ridge community has many commuters,, so connecting those two pieces could be very valuable for us (and likely many other GV municipalities).

Sunny Schiller | A Better Maple Ridge

What piece of bike infrastructure is needed next in your city?

Separated bike lanes help keep all road users safe. As a large percentage of Maple Ridge residents commute outside of the city for work designing infrastructure and supporting pieces (secure storage, changing rooms) will support more people in using alternative forms of transportation.

Do you agree that e-bikes and other micro-mobility have great potential and can be a game changer for a suburban community like Maple Ridge? Explain.

Yes, I do. I am seeing increased use of electric scooters and hover boards as the weeks go by. With an increasing focus on moving away from fossil fuels use and with an increasing and densifying population these devices will play a larger and larger role in moving people around. E-bikes have been proven across the world as a convenient and efficient mode of transportation for many groups of people, from seniors to people commuting to work and to regular people making daily trips. Particularly for a suburban community like Maple Ridge, many people feel they have no feasible alternative except to drive. E-bikes and more safe, separated bike infrastructure would allow residents to bike to other communities such as Langley and Coquitlam and significantly reduce traffic issues on key arteries such as Lougheed Highway.

What piece of bike infrastructure is needed next in your city?

Near miss technology in high collision areas.
