Unit 5: Two-Way Stop Intersection

Learning Objectives:


- 1. Can execute left and right turns while maintaining balance and control.
- 2. Can execute basic hand signals while riding.
- 3. Understands the proper use of stop signs and basic intersections.
- 4. Can shoulder check while riding without losing balance or control.

Set Up: Arrange rubber lines to create 2 intersecting roads. Place 2 stop signs and stop lines diagonal from one another.

Set Up Time: 20 minutes. Tip: yellow for inner lines.

Starting Positions: Students start by lining up behind the 2 stop lines. The instructor should be positioned by one sign.

Station Diagram:



and a quieter neighborhood road).

Delivery: Introduce the station, then have students travel along the roads and practice signaling and turning as you periodically pause the flow to introduce more complex turns.

1. Introduce the intersection

- How many stop signs are there?
- What do you call it when a road intersects another one?
- Point out the yellow road dividers, reminding them to always ride on the right.
- Help students visualize the scene by having them name the roads based on local roads (e.g., name a highway without stop signs



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2. Straight through the intersection

- Introduction: Enforce this key opening message: If you have a stop sign, stop! If you don't, keep moving! Look both ways and check for a gap in traffic before crossing straight across. There is no signal for going straight.
- *Demonstrate:* Ride (or ask a student to ride) demonstrate the first flow through the intersection, which is crossing straight through and turning right when exiting
- Activity: Allow the rest of the group to join the flow.

3. Turning right at the stop signs

- *Introduction:* Review the two options for a right turn signal. Look left to check for traffic, signal, and turn right when it is safe to do so.
- Activity: Have students turn right at each stop sign, and turn right again when exiting.

4. Turning left at the stop signs

- *Introduction:* Review the left turn signal. Look both ways to check for traffic, signal, and turn left into the far lane when it is safe to do so.
- Activity: Have students turn left at each stop sign, and turn right when exiting.

5. Free for all

- Activity: Students are free to turn right, left, or continue straight at each stop sign. Always turn right when exiting.
- Level up: Incorporate the use of the term 'Right of Way' throughout your discussions;
- Often misunderstood by students this age: when riding on the street with no stop signs: no need to stop. When turning left off the main road without a stop sign (this involves explaining the Right of Way rule that without a stop sign, vehicles traveling straight get to go before vehicles turning across their path). Left goes last.

How many stop signs are there?

- What do you call it when a road intersects another one?
- Help students visualize the scene by having them name the roads based on local roads
- If you have a stop sign, stop! If you don't, keep moving!



Right of Way re: 2 Way Stop

...or who gets to go first?

Answer: the first at the intersection



Or - who has to yield?

At intersections with all-way stop signs, the first road user to come to a complete stop has the right of way; if two or more arrive simultaneously, yield to the person on your right.
